

One-sided Paper Notebooks



Make an art project out of creating reused paper notebooks with your students. Collect paper used on only one side from your recycling bins and create notebook-sized stacks with the blank side up. Cut colorful cereal boxes for front and back covers, then bind with a spiral binding machine at your school or local copy store. Each ream of paper you conserve saves 18.5 pounds of carbon.
